

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

From Campaign to Implementation: Government Decisions and Actions




From Campaign to Implementation: Policy Successes

Civics 101: Levels and Branches of Government



Civics 101: Levels of Government

Federal: applies to everyone in the United States:

- Civil rights
- Right to education
- Climate policy
- Medicaid/Medicare
- SNAP/food stamps
- Federal tax dollar spending



Civics 101 – Levels of Government

State: applies to everyone in Massachusetts

- MBTA
- MassHealth
- Student discipline
- School policing
- State tax dollar spending



Civics 101 – Levels of Government

Local/Municipal: applies to each city or town

separately:

- Policing policies
- School curriculum
- Public library
- Property taxes
- Local revenue spending
- Green space and parks



One Issue: Multiple Levels of Government

Education Policy

- Federal: Special Education and civil rights of students, standardized testing
- State: Special Education funding, student discipline laws, MCAS testing
- Local: City/town school funding, school policing decisions, education curriculum

One Issue: Multiple Levels of Government

Criminal Legal Policy

- Federal: prosecuting local police departments for systemic civil rights violations; trafficking; crimes across state lines; federal prisons
- State: prosecuting violations of crimes within state; bail and detention policies; criminalizing/ decriminalized offenses; expungement; licensing of individual police officers
- Local: Police policies and enforcing state criminal laws

Civics 101: Branches of Government

Executive: responsible for implementing the law and running agencies that run government programs

Civics 101: Branches of Government

Legislative: responsible for making the laws



Federal: Congress



State: General Court



Local: City Council



Civics 101: Branches of Government

Judicial: responsible for interpreting the law and deciding how the law applies to people and circumstances



1) Which level (or levels) of Government and which branch (or branches) are discussed in the article?

Federal lawsuit alleging violation of Voting Rights Act

Level: Federal

Branch: Judicial

State "purging" of registered voters

Level: State

Branch: Executive

2) What is the policy the Governor is defending? What is his method of advancing this policy?

Limiting voting access of students and minorities by removing voters suspected of being non-citizens. Implementing election laws using **executive** powers regarding eligibility and deciding on location and hours of polling locations.


Discussion Questions

- 3) What is the policy the advocates are defending? What is their method of advancing this policy?
 - Expanding voting access by filing a federal lawsuit alleging state's executive branch voting law implementation disproportionately excludes Latinos and people of color.
- 4) How do these branches of government interact? How is it an example of checks and balances?
 - Executive power allows the Governor to decide how to run elections. However, a different branch (judicial) can limit that power by ruling that the implementation violates the constitution. Federal courts dictate limitations on state administration.

Advocacy Strategies

Demonstrate power in numbers

Mobilize and connect grassroots

High visibility action



Mobilizing constituents with a shared problem to take collective action

Building leadership within this constituency

Personal activism over the long term

Build Alternatives



Disrupt social and community problems by creating a community-led response and alternative
